Intrastate Funding Formula: Why it's Important to Greater MN

February 2023

What is the Intrastate Funding Formula (IFF)?

The Intrastate Funding Formula (IFF), or allocation formula, is used to allocate federal Older American Action (OAA) funds to Minnesota's Area Agencies on Aging (AAA).

That funding is distributed to local communities to support older adults.

Older Americans Act, Sec. 305 (a)(2)

"States shall, (C) in consultation with area agencies, in accordance with guidelines issued by the Assistant Secretary, and using the best available data, develop and publish for review and comment a formula for distribution within the State of funds received under this title that takes into account—

(i) the geographical distribution of older individuals in the State; and (ii) the distribution among planning and service areas of older individuals with greatest economic need and older individuals with greatest social need, with particular attention to low-income minority older individuals."

What does the IFF fund?

Nutrition: Home Delivered Meals (Meals on Wheels) and Congregate Dining, free or low-cost meals

Transportation: Senior Rides, free or low-cost rides to medical appointments


Chore Services: Snow Removal, Lawn Mowing


Homemaking Services, Grocery Delivery

Caregiver Services: Respite, Support Groups, Adult Day Services

Health Promotion Classes: Matter of Balance, Diabetes Self Management, Tai Chi Quan, SAIL and more!

What communities receive the funding?





Current Funding Formula

After applying the approved intrastate funding formula to each planning and service area using current census data, Area Agencies receive an allocation of OAA funds:

Dancing Sky AAA	11.35%
Arrowhead AAA	9.03%
 Central Minnesota Council on Aging 	14.03%
 Metropolitan AAA/Trellis 	41.69%
 Minnesota River AAA 	13.36%
 Southeast Minnesota AAA 	10.54%
 Minnesota Indian AAA 	N/A

Who decides how the formula is weighted?

The Administration on Community Living ultimately decides but a formula must be presented to them by the Minnesota Board on Aging (MBA).

The MBA is a 25-person governor appointed board.

The MBA has been working through a strategic process and have presented 5 different iterations of the funding formula to Minnesota Area Agencies on Aging.

The Draft Formula #5 will be presented for public comment. **YOU have an opportunity to weigh in.**

We Are Making Progress

In early iterations of the formula there were large losses (over 2M) for Greater MN AAA's and gains for Metro AAA's.

In the current formula the Minnesota Indian AAA is not included. The Minnesota Indian AAA is included in Draft #5

The Caveat: The proposed Draft #5 cuts to Greater MN are reduced, **but they are still cuts**. A reduction in Home and Community Based services and supports is not what Greater MN needs.

Equity for Greater MN Citizens is Required

The current formula weights heavily on population, which shifts dollars to the 7 county metro area.

Rural area's face challenges and barriers to service delivery because of sparse population and distance to services

Greater MN AAA's are calling for communities to ask that '60+Rural' and other factors that affect Greater Minnesotans be given a stronger value in the formula.

Considerations for Service Delivery in Rural Communities



Limited Infrastructure

Few transportation options and poorly maintained roads

Older housing in need of repairs, limited affordable senior housing

Limited or no access to technology in some areas, including broadband



Dispersed Population

Great distance between sparse populations

There are disincentives for providers to serve rural areas

Distance hampers older adults' access to services in the community



Demographic and Economic Trends

Working-age adults leaving rural areas

LTSS are dwindling forcing people to leave the region

Smaller workforce pool for providers

Fewer family members and volunteers to help older adults

Growing aging population eligible for services, including some high-need older adults

Supportive Services are Necessary

Access to Services are Limited

Only 37% (242) of all primary care clinics (661) are in rural areas.

Only 19% (208) of all specialty care clinics (1070) are in rural areas.

73% of Nursing Home Closures since 2011 were in Greater MN

MN has 94 designated healthcare professional shortage areas in 53 counties for dental and primary care. Zero are in the 7-county metro area.

Intrastate Funding Formula Comparison

- In Draft #5 Rural AAA's will lose funding
- The suggested changes would increase funding to all Rural AAA's statewide



The Funder of Last Resort

OAA funding is truly the funding of last resort in many Rural MN communities.

There are often no other options for service provisions for many of the individuals we serve, (especially Nutrition).

For homebound individuals there are very limited food delivery options and those include services like Amazon and delivered meals kits that would require broadband to order.


For those with no broadband, limited funding, and no transportation – there are virtually zero options outside of neighbors.

In most towns there are limited or no public transportation options, no taxi's, no Ubers – so access to food is left to Title III Home Delivered Meals or Title III funded homemaker programs such as grocery delivery and/or volunteer driver programs.

Access to Non-Title III Funding Opportunities

- Congressional Districts 2,3,4,5,6 serve all or parts of the Metro region and contain **740 Foundations**: \$1,868,000,000 Foundation dollars awarded in 2021
- Congressional District 8 serves parts of the AAAA region and contains **84 Foundations** \$ 168,000,000 (we have 4% of the options that Metro area has for alternate funding.)
- All of the western part of MN (District 7) only has **36** Foundations and \$9,000,000 available (Less than ½%)
- 2% of all foundation dollars in MN are directed specifically toward aging services

The giving reported here represents the location of the organization. In 2019, the 5th congressional district had the highest total grants paid. The 3rd congressional district had the largest number of grantmakers.

Other Implications

Loss of Jobs

Older Americans Act programming employs many people in the Arrowhead Region from congregate dining cooks, to in-home respite workers

Greater migration of population to Metro
Area or out of state

If these vital services cease to exist, older adults may be forced to move out of their homes

Increase in skilled nursing facility admissions

Due to lack of in-home supports

Exacerbated Chronic Health Conditions and increased falls among older adults

> Due to lack of proper nutrition, exercise, socialization, etc.

The Ask

Please help educate your communities.

It would support our aging community members in Greater MN if MBA would consider a IFF formula draft to reflect:

A decrease in the 60+ population to 20%, decrease 60+ with disability to 5%, increase 60+ rural to 25% and increase 60+ living alone to 10%. The final formula would look like this:

The net result would be an increase for all outstate AAA's.
